I James Boaz of Portland, eighty ~~three~~ years of age depose and say that I was acquainted with Silas Accrow late of said Portland, and that I was born & brought up in the same town with him, in Plymouth, Massachusetts, and that I knew when he entered the service in the Massachusetts line, <sup>in the Revolutionary war</sup> and that I was out with him the last three years service, and further that he was out in the service over seven years in all. Soon after the close of the Revolutionary war, his father's family and mine removed from Plymouth to North Yarmouth where said Accrow married my sister and I was present at the wedding. I further testify that the reason why he never received a pension, is, because he died before any pensions were granted by Congress.

I Sarah Accrow of Portland in the County of Cumberland and State of Maine, aged eighty five years, do, upon oath, declare

in order to obtain the benefit of a Resolve of the Legislature of Maine, passed March 17, 1835, entitled a "Resolve in favor of certain Officers and Soldiers of the Revolutionary War, and the Widows of the deceased Officers and Soldiers," that I am the widow of Silas Accrow late of Portland in the County of Cumberland and State of Maine, who died at

Portland on the about twenty day of years ago as near as I can recollect

That I have reason to believe, and do fully believe, that my said late husband, Silas Accrow did enlist at Plymouth in the Commonwealt of Massachusetts as a soldier for the first three months ~~years~~ service and afterwards for one year service and twice afterwards for three years each time and that he served as near as I can recollect about the whole of the revolutionary war and was honorably discharged

I do further on oath declare that I have reason to believe, and do fully believe, that my said late husband, Silas Accrow was at the time of his said enlistment, an inhabitant of

Plymouth in Massachusetts and after the war, moved to North Yarmouth in this State where we were married

and that I do know that he was at the time of his decease as aforesaid, an inhabitant of the said State of Maine, residing in Portland aforesaid, where he had resided for about Ten — years before his decease. That I have reason to believe, and do fully believe,

that neither my said late husband, nor any one claiming under him did receive, (nor have I received since his decease,) a grant of land, or money in lieu thereof, from the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, for his said service, or any other service during the Revolutionary War, and that I am therefore justly entitled to the full benefit of said Resolve.

This I know because I was out with him in the Service, and we returned from the war together. My Parents had moved from Plymouth to North Yarmouth while I was in the Service. The marriage services were performed by Esq Lewis or Esq Merrill, I do not recollect which it was, as my recollection is impaired from the lapse of time
